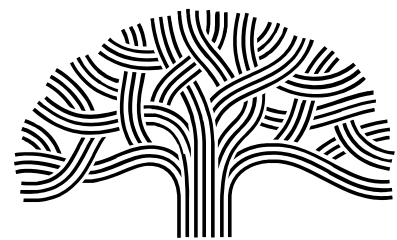


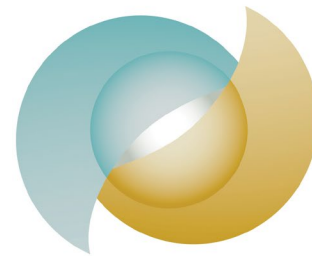

OAKLAND FUND FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH (OFCY)

- Established by the voter-approved Kids First! Initiative (Measure K) in 1996 to support direct services to youth under 21.
- Reauthorized by voters through Measure D in 2009 (for 2009–2020) and by City Council in 2020 (for 2021-2033).
- 3% of unrestricted General Purpose Fund; updated strategic plan required every 3 years. Forms the basis for RFPs to fund youth and family services.
- OFCY services support these four goal areas:

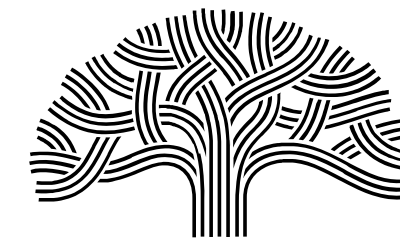

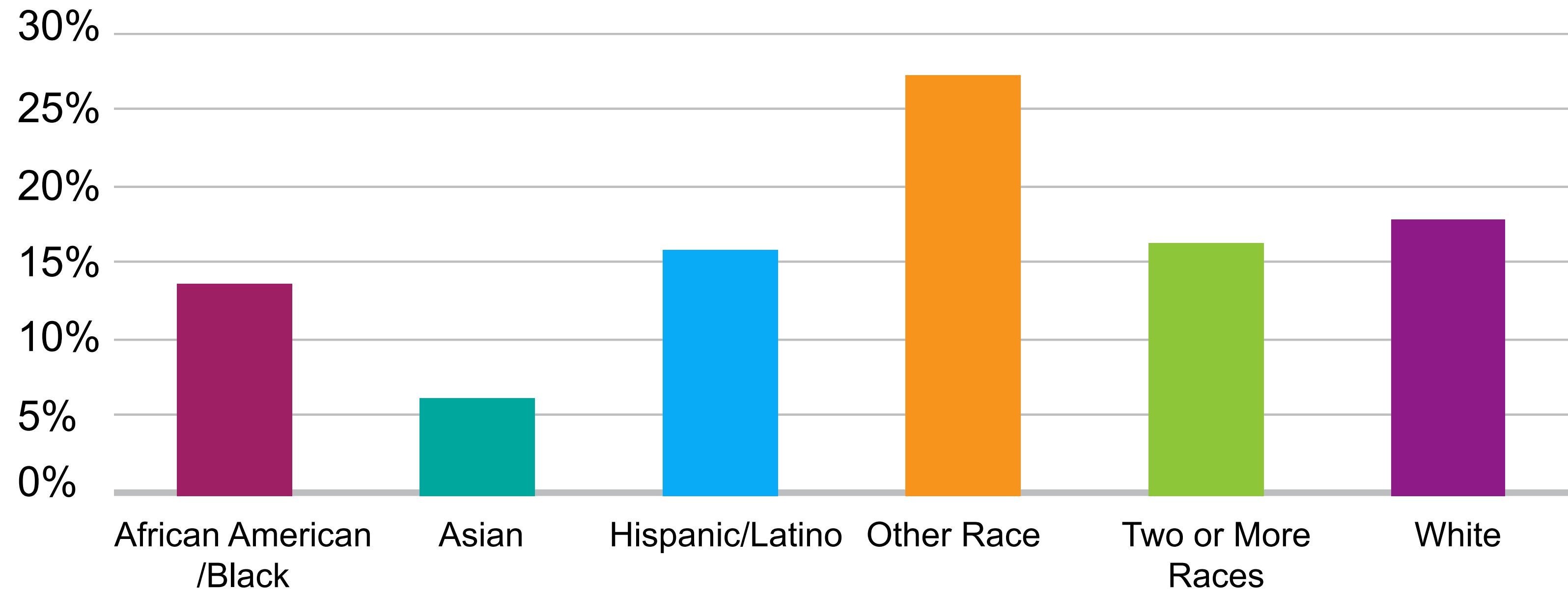

Racial Identity of Oakland's Youth (2022)

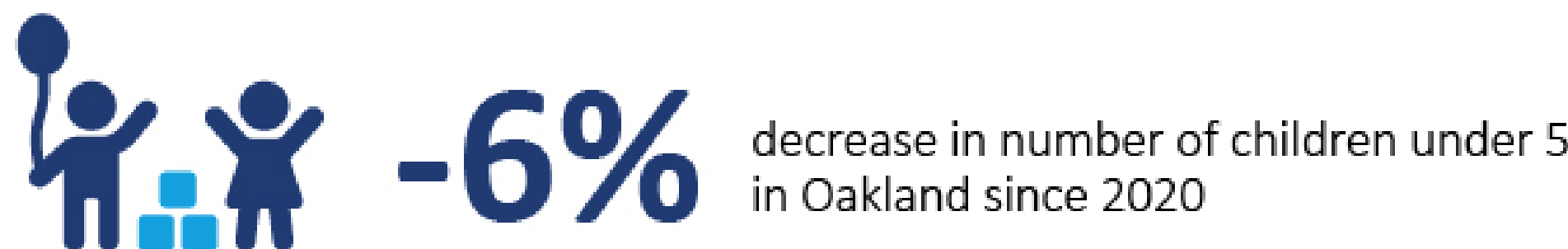
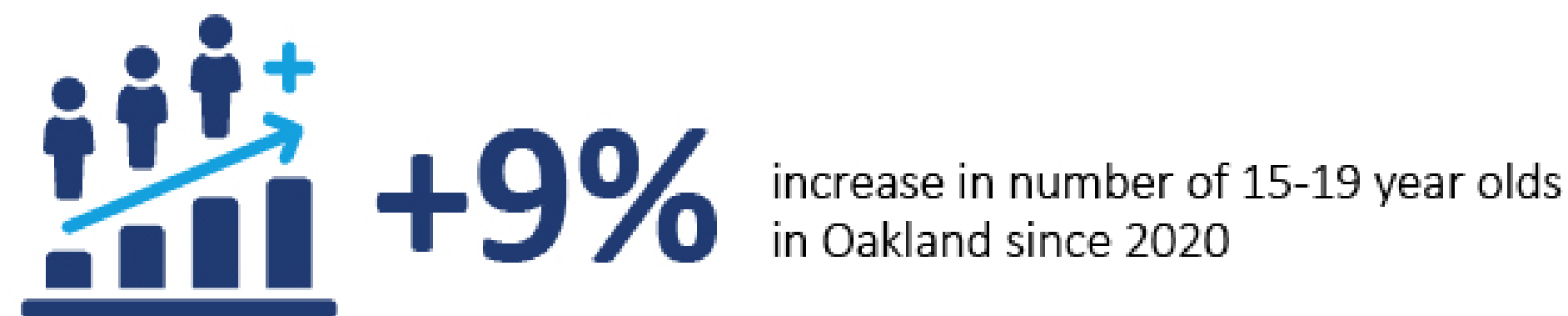


American Indian and **Alaskan Native** make up 2% of total.

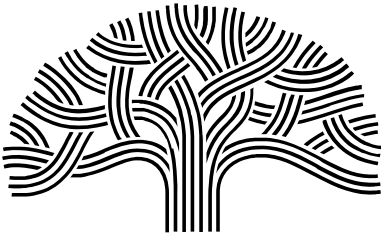

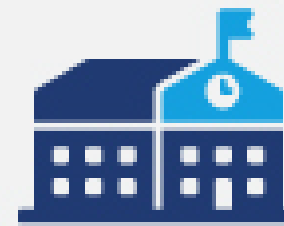

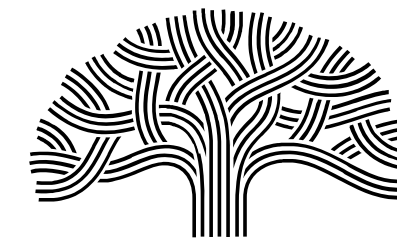
