Program: Project Pride

Annual Grant Funding: \$75,000

Program Summary: LifeLong Medical Care proposes to continue the Children's Services Program at Project Pride, its residential treatment program. The program will serve a minimum of 20 children and 20 adults annually. It will provide developmental assessments, parenting education groups, parent/child dvad sessions, case management for parenting needs, and field trips/activities for the mothers and children. Length of stay at Project Pride is typically between 4 to 12 months. The goal is to reduce the children's risk for adverse childhood events and strengthen the mother's understanding of healthy development.





Percent of Parents/Caregivers in Agreement (N = 3)





















Agency Name: Jewish Family & Community Services East Bay Program: Integrated Early Childhood Consultation Program

Annual Grant Funding: \$175,000

Program Summary: The Integrated Early Childhood Consultation Program (IECCP) is a collaboration between JFCS East Bay and Oakland Unified School District (OUSD) to provide early childhood mental health services via consultations, parenting workshops, and screening/referrals to increase children's academic, social, and emotional success. In school year 2023-24, IECCP will serve 8 preschools with over 360 children, 32 educators, and 507 parents. JFCS East Bay will also support OUSD's Multi Tiered Systems Support (MTSS) to increase access to inclusive education for children with disabilities. *The updated numbers projections are based on recent conversations with OUSD re: current and projected site enrollment for FY 22-23.





Percent of Parents/Caregivers in Agreement (N = 1)









Program Summary: Lincoln's Early Childhood Collaborative (Lincoln, UCSFBCHO, and OTTP) will provide services at 12 OUSD Child Development Centers to educators, and 1,000 low-income, at-risk children, ages 2-5, and 250 caregivers annually. Services include social-emotional and developmental screenings, child specific consultations, workshops with caregivers and educators, community events, resource linkages, child/family treatment with mental health professionals to promote socio-emotional well-being, and the early identification and treatment of developmental delays and behavior concerns in children.




Distribution of Youth Participants by Oakland Zip Code









Agency Name: Oakland Parks, Recreation & Youth Development

Program: Community Adventure Pre-K Playgroup (C.A.P.P)

Annual Grant Funding: \$100,000

Program Summary: C.A.P.P. is a program projected to serve 60 children ages 0-5 in Oakland and their parents/ caregivers at 3 Recreation centers twice a week from August–May. The program hours are 9:30-12PM. C.A.P.P. serves underserved communities in Oakland. Playgroups will provide healthy snacks daily and will focus on preschool/kindergarten readiness by providing circle time, arts and crafts projects, story time, field trips, and much more. Participants will learn fundamental concepts such as days of the week, months of the year, colors, seasons, and develop familiarity with letters, numbers, and counting. This program also supports social emotional learning, fine and gross motor skill development, and cognitive development. The desired outcome is for families to build a community and for the children to leave from our program being equipped with the skills to thrive in a full-time preschool/kindergarten learning environment.








Distribution of Youth Participants by Oakland Zip Code










