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Agency Name: Lincoln

Program: West Oakland Initiative (WOI)

Annual Grant Funding: \$200,000

Program Summary: Lincoln's West Oakland Initiative is a culturally responsive academic intervention program that integrates social-emotional development, parent engagement, and case management. A three-tiered approach serves 180 unduplicated West Oakland Middle School students via one-on-one academic support, small group interventions, and school-wide activities. The program provides a subset of 24 students with intensive Academic and or Social Emotional support plans, case management, social-emotional learning experiences, and peer leadership opportunities to bolster academic progress, engagement, wellness, and life transitions.









Agency Name: Fresh Lifelines for Youth, Inc.

Program: FLY Middle School Program for Oakland Youth

Annual Grant Funding: \$60,000

Program Summary: FLY's Middle School Program offers two levels of support for middle schoolersto help them connect to their education to prevent them from getting caught in the pipeline to prison. Law-related education teaches youth about laws, consequences of crimes, and their rights, while building vital life skills. One-on-one educational mentoring case management allows youth to connect with their education and address barriers to academic success. The Middle School Program will serve 30 youth in law-related education across 2-3 Oakland middle schools and 5 (duplicated) youth in case management per year.









Agency Name: East Oakland Boxing Association Program: EOBA - After-school program - Grades 6-8

Annual Grant Funding: \$100,000

Program Summary: EOBA's after school program serves 80 low-income, at-risk schoolages (K-12 youth); with 50-60 of these youth in an on-site after-school setting (September – May) located in deep East Oakland that provides 4-6 hours of daily academic support, and both enrichment and health/wellness programming with the goal of providing youth with the tools, resources, and support needed to become successful and thriving adults. Due to our ongoing waitlist for the after-school program as the community need exceeds what we can provide, an additional 20-25 students are enrolled in our virtual enrichment program.





Race/Ethnicity (N = 66)



Gender Identity (N = 66)











Program: Elev8 Youth

Annual Grant Funding: \$100,000

Program Summary: Safe Passages proposes to partner with 3 school communities, Coliseum College Prep, Madison Park, and United for Success, in East Oakland to provide 190 low-income, middle school students of color living in high stress neighborhoods with increased access to mentoring, community building, community service, and holistic wellness supports. Services provided daily during the regular school year & summer. Programming is designed to increase school attendance, improve school connectedness and connections to caring adults, and promote youths' agency, self-esteem, growth mindset, and mental health.







Agency Name: The Unity Council

Program: The Unity Council Latino Men & Boys Program

Annual Grant Funding: \$250,000

Program Summary: LMB is a year-round, culturally-rooted mentoring program operating at five OUSD middle schools. We strengthen the socio-emotional wellness and empowerment of 75 youth, ages 11-15, while preparing them for their transition to high school. Mentors provide trauma-informed individual and group interventions, education, and resources to create pathways for healthy development. We significantly increase attendance rates and grades, and improve student engagement, healthy relationships and resilience, and academic focus. It is the only youth program in Oakland public schools serving Latino boys.






