**Program Summary:** Youth Beat will provide Media Arts & Leadership Training to 105 14-18 year olds at 5 Oakland school sites with the goal of helping underserved BIPOC youth build the skills, confidence and motivation needed to succeed in school and career. Youth will participate in high dosage after school and summer programs. They will 1) learn technical and creative media skills, 2) learn to work in teams, 3) develop leadership and other soft/social-emotional skills, 4) explore and give voice to their own unique interests/identities, 5) build lasting friendships, and 6) connect with mentors.





#### **Percent of Youth in Agreement (N = 21)**





**Program Summary:** BORP's year-round sports and recreation program for youth with disabilities will serve 35 Oakland youth ages 6-21 with a variety of fun, challenging activities including wheelchair basketball at James Kenney gym, sled hockey at Oakland Ice, cycling at Emerson Elementary, field trips and nature outings at local parks. Transportation, outreach and family engagement are included components. In a safe, supportive setting, youth will increase physical activity levels, health and wellness, build caring relationships with peers and adults, increase confidence, social and leadership skills, and connection to community.





#### **Percent of Youth in Agreement** (N = 22)





**Agency Name: Dimensions Dance Theater** 

**Program: Rites of Passage Annual Grant Funding:** \$74,050

**Program Summary:** The Rites of Passage after-school program will annually serve over 350 Oakland youth, primarily Black and also primarily those who identify as female, aged 8-18. Our goal is to create a space of belonging that centers our youth and their voices through culturally relevant arts education. The after-school program happens at the Malonga Casquelourd Center for the Arts in three sessions (Summer, Fall, and Spring), and will include: dance and music classes; the creation and performance of new choreographic work; field trips; Internships & Apprenticeships; mentoring; and integral life skills workshops.





#### **Percent of Youth in Agreement** (N = 34)





**Program Summary:** REAL HARD is an after school youth leadership program at Castlemont, Fremont, Oakland High, Oakland Tech, and Skyline high schools. REAL HARD staff partner with 100 diverse youth annually to develop leadership skills, cultivate community, learn social justice curriculum, and lead campaigns that engage thousands of their peers to improve campus culture, establish positive learning environments, and build power and equity for Oakland students. REAL HARD students meet 2x weekly after school and also conduct research, lead workshops, and host events to promote their work during school hours.





#### Percent of Youth in Agreement (N = 41)





**Program Summary:** Oakland SCORES promotes the social, emotional, physical, and cognitive development of young people through a unique and fun combination of soccer team-based physical activity, poetry, and service learning projects. The program will serve 320 students as part of the after-school program at 16 Oakland schools throughout the school year, most of them in East Oakland. **Agency Name: Attitudinal Healing Connection** 

**Program: Oakland Legacy Project Annual Grant Funding:** \$450,000

**Program Summary:** The Oakland Legacy Project (OLP) will provide arts programming, environmental teaching, and leadership development for 300+ Oakland students annually. At elementary and middle schools, AHC teachers will integrate art making and environmental awareness into 2 classes per week and on field trips. High schoolers commit to meeting 2-3 days/week at the AHC studio. OLP fosters critical thinking by exposing young people to new environments, artistic expression, and leadership opportunities. Participants develop self-esteem and a global sense of themselves as valuable changemakers.

**Program Summary:** Oakland Leaf's internship provides year-round youth development opportunities to 30 East Oakland High School students (92% Black and Latinx). Interns participate twice a week, Sept through June, in a Youth Development cohort or an Urban Farming cohort, where they engage in experiential learning, personal and professional development, social and emotional learning, civic education, and community action initiatives. 



#### **Percent of Youth in Agreement** (N = 18)





#### Percent of Youth in Agreement (N = 22)













#### **Percent of Youth in Agreement** (N = 2)







**Agency Name: Restorative Justice for Oakland Youth (RJOY)** 

**Program: Youth Program** 

**Annual Grant Funding: \$225,000** 

**Program Summary:** RJOY will hire 50 middle, high school and transitional age as paid youth apprentices (30 school year, 20 summer) who will receive violence prevention and leadership development training. We employ youth as apprentices to help organize and facilitate the Restorative Justice healing circles and engage in social justice movement building. The youth design individual life design plans, and facilitate RJ circles, and RJ social action. Youth meet 3 times each week with staff and visit the agency's farm and healing center for 12 overnight stays during both the academic year and summer program.
