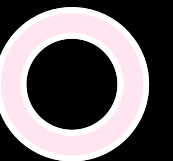


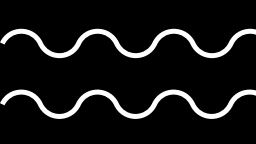


INVOICING & PAYMENTS

The City of Oakland is instituting a new online Accounts Payable management system called the AP Portal. This is being rolled out City-wide to all City departments and vendors. **The following AP Portal information is specific to OFCY grants.** If your organization has other contracts/grants with other City departments, please contact them for AP Portal guidance.

- OFCY grantees will **ONLY** use Cityspan GMS to invoice OFCY through the quarterly progress reports. Grantees do **NOT** have to upload the OFCY invoices into the AP Portal themselves.
- OFCY staff will upload the approved invoices into the AP Portal on the grantee's behalf.
- OFCY staff will need to enter a grantee email address when uploading the invoice into the AP Portal. **The default email used will be the Contract Representative listed in the Cityspan Program Contact Information form.**
 - The Contract Representative will receive an email notifying them that an AP Portal account has been created for them.
 - They may log-in to this account to check the status of their invoice(s) but it is not necessary for the processing of the invoice check.
 - There is no action step for the Contract Representative in the AP Portal; it is purely informational.





VERSIONING

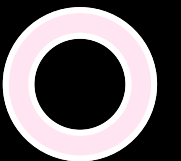
All Scope of Work modifications requests must be submitted through the versioning process in Cityspan. This system will track both the grantee modification requests and the Grant Manager's determination. **The Versioning process is currently available and a demonstration video can be found on <https://www.ofcy.org/grantee/cityspan/>.**

Budget

Two Budget modifications are allowed per year. Budget modifications are only necessary if there is more than a 10% difference in a line item from what was approved. No changes in budget are permitted after the last day of the third quarter (March 31st).

With this success, CURYJ found its framework: combining hyper-local culturally-rooted direct services with statewide policy and advocacy to disrupt systems of oppression.

Dream Beyond Bars Fellowship

A 1-year paid fellowship, committing to 15-20 hours a week, \$25 per hour and opportunities for extra hours.

Criteria:

- Applicants should be 18-25 years old (but open to older adults)
- Resident of Alameda County
- Young adults who are formerly incarcerated or on probation/parole
- Applicants should have demonstrated leadership in their communities/campus

Dream Beyond Bars Leadership Institute

A 4-month program, committing to 8 sessions over 4 months, with a \$1,000 stipend, and opportunities for extra paid time. This program will build leaders in the Dream Beyond Bars campaign which demands that Alameda County invest millions of dollars into creating alternatives to youth incarceration.

Criteria:

- Applicants should be young adults (but open to older adults), a resident of Alameda county, and directly impacted (i.e., formerly incarcerated or on probation/parole, experience with foster care, etc.)

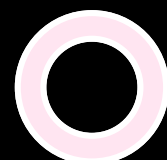

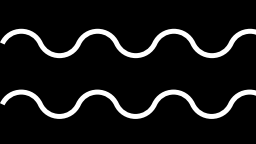
The Dream Beyond Bars application is officially open! We are recruiting for two opportunities: the DBB Fellowship and the DBB Leadership Institute.

The **DBB Fellowship** is a 12-month paid fellowship that will train formerly incarcerated young adults (18-25) to engage in our policy work at a local and statewide level.

The **DBB Leadership Institute** is a condensed organizing program that will equip participants with the knowledge and skills to be leaders in the Dream Beyond Bars campaign for Alameda County to invest in alternatives to youth incarceration.

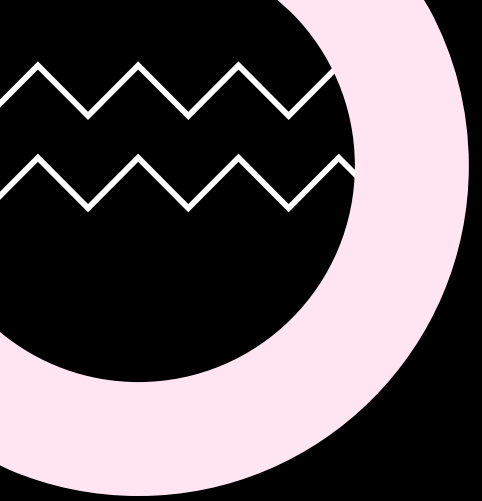
